## President's Report

Over the last couple of years the officers of ILWU Canada have been spending a lot of time defending the work that we do. Ever since Fraser Surrey Docks announced their intent to ship a small amount of coal, the environmentalist attack has been unrelenting. The lies they have been telling about the effects of coal dust have been amazing. The line I use all the time is "We have people working up to their knees on coal for thirty years with no bad health effects but you are trying to tell people that one coal train extra per day, passing within five kilometers of an elementary school will kill our children". Lies like this and others are degrading to our Members that make their living shipping coal.

Our Union has been working in a loose coalition of other unions that represent coal workers, to get out the message that coal is safe and provides a good living to our workers. We represent workers at three coal terminals, Westshore, Neptune and Ridley, and have between 500 and 600 members working in coal. The coalition we work with contains the

United Steel Workers that represent miners and also represent the workers at the terminal on Texada that is slated to handle the Fraser Surrey Coal, The BC Building Trades that represent the workers that build the coal mine infrastructure, the International Union of Operating Engineers that are part of the Building Trades but also represent coal miners and the Teamsters Rail Conference that represent the railway workers that haul the coal from the mines to our terminals. Between us all we jointly represent about 50,000 people that work in coal. Coal is a large part of the industrial base of BC and provides a lot of tax revenue that goes toward our health and education systems.

An important thing to remember about the coal we export is that most of it is steelmaking coal but we

also ship a large amount of thermal coal that heats peoples' homes and lights there houses. The reason this is important is that many people in Canada also have electricity that has been generated by burning coal and overall in North America 40% of the electricity is generated from burning coal. When I hear people say coal is yesterdays' fuel, they are just so wrong. It may be yesterdays' fuel in BC but not everywhere else in North America.

We have also been involved in the bigger topic of resource development and we have the same people speaking out against just about every development in the province that speak against coal. Unionized workers in resource development such as forestry, mining, oil and gas etc. built this province. Although the resource sector does not play as large a role in the BC economy as it did in the past it still does play a large role in generating good incomes throughout BC. Most of the work we do involves the exporting of these resources, whether it is work-

ing longshore, working on towboats, working for the deep-sea pilots or our workers in the Port Authorities, all these jobs are intricately involved in the resource sector.

We have recently become involved in a group called Resource Works and I have recently been asked to sit on their Advisory Board along with others from Unions, government and industry. Resource Works have published an editorial that I wrote on their web page at [www.resource-works.ca](http://www.resource-works.ca) and have also helped me write and get out my Labour Day message that was published on the editorial page of the Vancouver Sun on August 29, and was subsequently republished in a few other newspapers. It is important that we all remember the jobs we do are tied to the resource sector and it is also important that we get the word out to everyone in BC what an important role we in the ILWU play in making BC such a great place to live.

## 1st V.P. Report

I would like to take a quick second to thank those of you who have supported through the last couple of years, and throughout our last convention.

We are still, defending our Unions position on the export of coal to other countries, we have been working with the USW, Building Trades, Operating Engineers, and the Teamsters Canada Rail Conference on this issue. Our five Unions have been meeting with members of the government, as well as groups that bring the waterfront communities together to ensure our voices are heard in the coal debate. Our 5 Unions have taken on the job of defending our jobs in not only the Coal export market but in other areas as well. Such as pipelines, it's amazing how many arguments that one word can produce. This by far in my opinion is the easiest and can be the safest way to move product to the coasts of our country (if done properly). We advocate that if and when these pipelines are built, they be built with Union labour, not company Unions, or companies that are non-union. We advocate that when the natural resources of our province are brought to market that through the entire supply chain the workers that are there are covered by Union collective agreements. By doing this we are protecting our economy, our families, and our communities. We will stand by our Brothers and Sisters in these other Unions to make sure it is our Members who benefit from these jobs.

In March I was able to attend the Longshore Contract Caucus in San Francisco with Brothers Glen Edwards President ILWU Local 505 Prince Rupert, and Rino Voci Business Agent ILWU Local 500. The delegates that were in attendance were not just from the mainland down south but from Hawaii, and Alaska as well, both of whom will be going into Collective Bargaining within the next few months. This was the main caucus before our Sisters and Brothers started negotiations for the coast wide collective agreement July 1st. During this caucus we heard much debate about an assortment of issues each Local is facing up and down the coast. But the biggest part of the debate was on the Health and Welfare package. In Canada as we all know we have a medical system that is set up that all citizens have a right to free medical. It may not be perfect and we all piss and moan about the delays but at least when our families need it, it is there. With ObamaCare being put into place, it will have unfortunately become a great financial

burden on the medical coverage the ILWU Longshore Division gets now through the Collective Bargaining process. In this Canadians view the Obama administration is going in the right direction, I say this only because a countries citizens deserve free medical care, corporations should not get rich off of the sick and dying. I know our Brothers and Sisters in the USA have a heck of a negotiation in front of them, but with the leadership that the International has I am positive the ILWU will come out on top.

During the negotiations that are ongoing for the Master Collective Agreement a bitter dispute is still ongoing in Vancouver Washington (Local 4), and Portland Oregon (Local 8), these two locals have been locked out of their grain terminals for over 450 days now, I got to meet some of the Brothers and Sisters on the line and on the water picket line when I traveled down there with Dominic Demarco Labour Relations Rep, Antonio Pantusa, and Rino Voci all with Local 500. As you walk up to the gate you see men and women walking the line carrying picket signs, defending the jurisdiction which is rightfully theirs, they walk the line and let the scabs crossing the line know what they truly are...the lowest forms of life. Not a lot of cars but a few go through management types, still scabs none the less...but then it happens, the bus showed up. The SCAB BUS, now remember these bastards on the bus are taking the jobs from our Brothers and Sisters in the ILWU, and worse yet the driver herself is a member of another union, she is the lowest form a life, a union member that crosses a line is not a union member but is worse than the scabs that take our jobs. Then the bus passes through, unfortunately this happens every shift change every day, but our people in Locals 4 and 8 standing strong and show these foreign corporations that we will not go away, that we will fight for what is ours! And on behalf of ILWU Canada her Locals and Affiliates I thank them for being who they are, OUR Brothers and Sisters.

I was able to attend the Grain Services Union convention at Black Strap Resort in Saskatoon, Saskatchewan. We debated resolutions throughout the week as well as listened to some very impassioned speakers. I would like to thank all our Brothers and Sisters in the GSU for an exciting convention as well as my new knowledge of our members in the GSU. The main entertainment for the dinner evening was a hypnotist, I would like to say it was a memorable show...but I have little recollection of it.

ILWU Canada has decided to support the BC Federation of Labour in sponsoring and getting behind the BC Lions program

Western Regional Summer Institute for Union Women

## UNION WOMEN FROM U.S. AND CANADA ATTENDED UNIVERSITY

**T**he British Columbia Federation of Labour hosted the Western Regional Summer Institute for Union Women at the University of Victoria on July 8 to 12, 2014. The event was attended by over 200 women from the US and Canada. Both American and Canadian sisters represented the ILWU; there were 5 delegates from Local 500, 1 delegate from Local 502, 1 delegate from LWU Canada, and 7 delegates from Local 142.

The theme of the Institute was “Together Women Win” and the Institute focused on giving participants the tools, skills, and confidence to assume leadership positions in their unions and their communities. The core courses included collective bargaining, combating bullying in the workplace, and public speaking and parliamentary procedure.

Each Summer Institute attempts to support a local action, and the action associated with the 2014 Institute was a stroller brigade rally at the steps of the BC Legislature. The focus of the action was to draw attention to and grow support for the Coalition of Child Care Advocates of BC’s initiative to lobby the Provincial Government for the \$10-a-day childcare system. This would be a publicly funded early child care system that would make quality child care accessible to all BC families; publicly funded child care is treated as a public good, rather than a commodity. Increasing the quality of child care includes attracting and retaining first-class Child Care Workers; thus, the plan also focuses on increasing the floor wage of Child Care Workers.

The 2015 Western Regional Summer Institute for Union Women will be held in Portland, Oregon. I would urge all Locals to Save the Dates of June 23 to 27, 2015, and to canvas to their sisters for interest in the event. Let’s ensure that the ILWU is well represented from all regions on the West Coast!

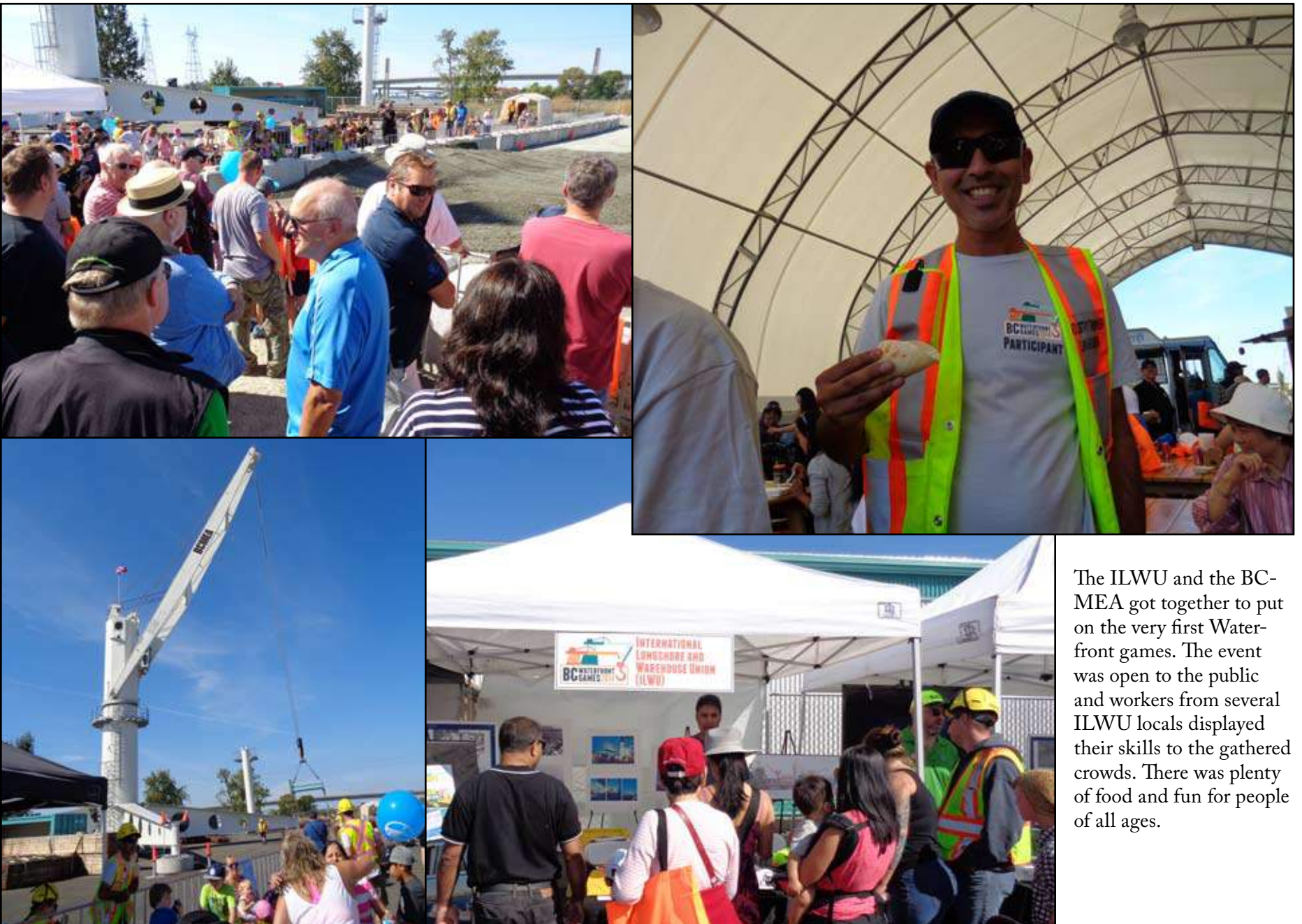
